

Students Want A Post Secondary Experience



- 83% of QHS Students Want a Post Secondary Pathway (Limitless H2P)
- 63% Believe They Can Afford Post Secondary (Limitless H2P)
- 48% of QHS Staff Believe Students Can Afford Post Secondary (Limitless H2P)
- 84% of secondary students report having strong relationships with teachers and peers (Panorama)
- AI Student Story Themes- Strong Family Identity and Support Structures, Students Want to Stay Close to Home, Want Careers of Service that will Benefit their Community such as Medical, Education, or Technology Industry.

Data We're Monitoring

- Foundational Literacy (STAR,DDS, SBA and Science of Reading)
- Freshman Success Rates, 80% On-Track
- Becoming Data Informed
 - ERDC Remediation Rates 10% (Four Year) and 15% (2-Year) Dramatic Drop
 - NSC data shows that 45% of QSD students enroll in college the year after they graduate. Of those students, 81% persist from year one to year two.
 - ERDC shows that eight years after graduation only 15% of students have a BA or higher after graduating from QHS, and only 17% have an Associates degree or certificate.





Current Challenges We're Facing

- Academic Preparedness Challenges
 - Taps on the shoulder professional learning for all staff in the full pathways to graduation and beyond options
- Social Emotional & Physical Well-being Challenges
 - High levels of anxiety and depression, and limited resources to support those needs.
- College and Career Knowledge Challenges
 - Application Process (irrelevant to current educators)
 - Support for trade internships (money, restrictions in availability, labor laws, etc.)
 - Systems for a supportive hand-off to colleges & trade schools
 - Economic realities for students to go to college
